Pastoral Musing... If you do not have a subscription to The Trinitarian, I suggest you pick up a copy of the September-October edition (or see the pdf. file attached to the email the newsletter came in). In it are three articles written by three of the G3 bishops, two ACC and one APA, on evangelism. Each has a unique yet complementary perspective on faithful Anglo-Catholic evangelism. What I found most complementary is how each bishop emphasizes that true evangelism comes from the "inside, out" (my words). It's ineffective for a parish to launch public schemes of evangelism (often under the guise of "church growth") without first living the evangel (the Gospel) personally and internally. Evangelism isn't generically calling people to Christ. It's calling people to a life in Christ; a life that priest, parishioner and parish are already living. To quote Archbishop Haverland's article "Effective parishes tend to have strong internal life, built around common prayer, the daily and weekly round of the community's Eucharistic celebration and ongoing learning. Effective parishes have strong a community life with mutual care, nurturing, service, and love. This internal life, built with sound teaching, produces something attractive to others." There are three ways to strengthen the internal life of a parish: 1. A commitment to holiness of life. Priest and parishioners must be set apart for God and have a Biblical and Catholic worldview that guides their thinking and manner of living. 2. Obedience to the Great Commission. This is as simple as telling what we know to whom we know (and then backing it up with our manner of life). 3. Being Prayerful. Pray for our parish and parishioners daily. Pray for a deft touch when visitors come, that we welcome but not smother. Pray we find ways as a parish to connect with and serve our community. The "success" of evangelistic efforts is in the hands of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:47). Our part is to be faithful and provide fertile soil for those whom He leads to us to be able to plant roots and grow. – Fr. Beutell

The 2024-25 Wednesday Bible study session has begun...We have mass each week at 10:30 a.m. and then study afterwards from 11:30 a.m. to no later than 12:45 p.m. We are studying the Book of Revelation. The study guide we are using is Coming Soon: Unlocking the Book of Revelation by Michael Barber (published by Emmaus Road). On the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month we meet in the living room of the Lagdon-White house from Noon to 12:45 pm and discuss the book <u>Guide to the Mass</u> (From the 1928 Book of Common Prayer) by Jackie Jamison with Fr. Sean McDermott. Whether you are new to Anglo-Catholicism or a seasoned parishioner, this book is helpful for understanding the "what's and why's" of our liturgy.

The Vestry met on September 15...Treasurer Todd Allerton reported tithes last 6 weeks were \$1977 and for the last 3 months: \$6800 (July was significantly below average) Expenses the last 3 months were \$7278 (this includes extra principal toward LW Hall mortgage).
